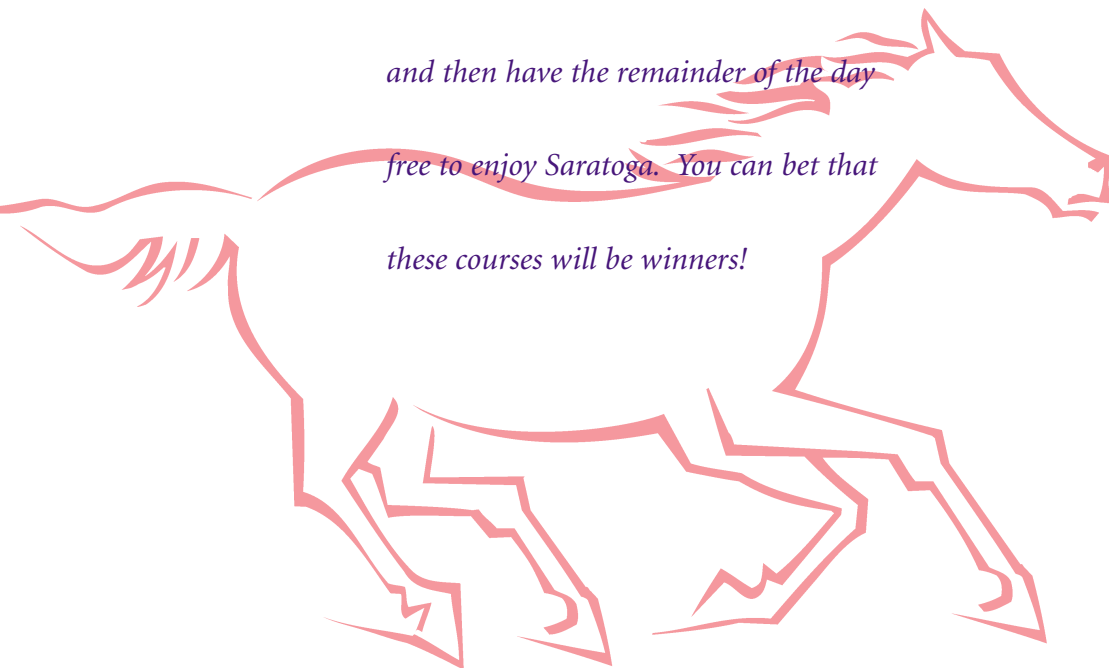

Courses

August 6, 2010

Current Developments in Family Law

Professor Melissa Breger, Albany Law School

This CLE course will introduce cutting-edge issues in family law in New York State. Some of the highlights include how courts are interpreting the new "intimate partner" language of Family Court Act Article 8; how the change in nomenclature from Law Guardian to Attorney for Child affects family law practice; how recent U.S. Supreme Court cases affect individual juvenile delinquency proceedings; how the 2010 case law expands same-sex parental rights; and whether technology is starting to reshape family law. The course will also outline the Governor's 2009 Omnibus Domestic Violence Legislation and the Safe Harbor for Exploited Children Act with relation to family law practice.

August 13, 2010

New York Practice Update 2010

Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Law David D. Siegel, Albany Law School and Professor Patrick M. Connors, Albany Law School

This course will address the major developments in New York Civil Practice in the past year. This update will review recent rules and decisions on civil procedure including, among a host of issues: the new rule on a clerk's duty to accept papers for filing, the requirement of a defendant's insurer to attend conferences, the requirement that an attorney may only sign an affidavit of mailing if the attorney personally does the mailing, the need to reveal settlements to non-settlers and the issue of who pays for electronic disclosure.
